

About Us

The Alliance for Child Protection in Humanitarian Action (the Alliance) supports the efforts of humanitarian actors to achieve high-quality and effective child protection interventions in humanitarian settings. Through its technical Working Groups, Task Forces and Initiatives, the Alliance develops inter-agency operational standards and provides technical guidance to support the work of child protection actors in humanitarian settings. The Alliance pursues five permanent workstreams:

- 1) Standard setting and guidance development;
- 2) Capacity strengthening, learning and development;
- 3) Evidence generation and knowledge management;



Vision

The Alliance envisions a world in which children are protected from abuse, neglect, exploitation and violence in humanitarian settings. Our mission is to support the efforts of humanitarian actors to achieve high-quality and effective child protection interventions in both refugee and non-refugee humanitarian contexts.



Working Groups & Task Forces

The four Working Groups contribute to the workstreams and are currently reinforced by Task Forces and Initiatives that focus on specific, technical child protection issues.



<u>Child Protection Minimum</u> <u>Standards (CPMS)</u>

The mission of this Working Group is to support technical standard setting and to promote the use and integration of the CPMS while learning from their use and improving them.

The aim of this Task Force is to ensure practical and technical coordination and collaboration to strengthen the quality and effectiveness of child labour preparedness, prevention and response actions in emergencies.

This Task Force aims to support and strengthen the capacities of field practitioners in programming for CAAFAG, including through development of technical resources and the set-up of a community of practice.

<u>Community-Level Child</u> <u>Protection</u>

The goal of the Task Force is to support implementing agencies and child protection actors to have the necessary tools, resources and capacity to implement in this area.

This Task Force aims at enhancing protection of unaccompanied and separated children in situations of conflict and natural disaster through strengthening and harmonising case management of UASC.

The Alliance Initiatives

In addition to the Working Groups and Task Forces, the Alliance has developed a <u>series of initiatives</u> to support specific areas of CPHA and help maintain linkages with other global bodies.

Prevention Initiative

The goal of the Prevention Initiative is to increase understanding of and prioritise prevention as a critical element of child protection across humanitarian action. Prevention is key to achieving <u>Sustainable Development Goal</u> 16.2 to end all forms of violence against children and the realization of children's rights and fulfils the ethical duty of humanitarians to both do no harm and prevent harm where possible.



The Prevention Initiative works by:

- Increasing understanding and capacity on prevention through the sharing of evidence-based research, practices and tools;
- Engaging with other sectors to facilitate the development of joint child protection prevention strategies; and
- Promoting the prioritization of prevention funding and programming through evidence on prevention as cost-saving and life-saving.

<u>Protection of Children During the COVID-19 Pandemic</u>

Since COVID-19 was declared a global pandemic, the Alliance has been working to produce and disseminate much-needed technical guidance, advocacy material, and best practices in relation to the impact of the pandemic on the protection of children. Since March 2020, the Alliance has developed the <u>Technical Note on the Protection of Children during the Coronavirus Pandemic</u> with nine accompanying technical annexes and more, found at the Alliance <u>COVID-19 Resource Hub</u>.



<u>Child Protection in Humanitarian Action and Education in Emergencies</u>

The Alliance is working together with the <u>Inter-Agency Network for Education in Emergencies (INEE)</u> to encourage and support collaboration between the two sectors. The aim is to develop closer collaboration between CPHA & EiE actors at all levels of the Humanitarian Programme Cycle and at every stage in response.

General members of the Alliance can apply for core membership after at least a year of being an active general member. They form the Steering Committee and set the strategic direction of the Alliance.




